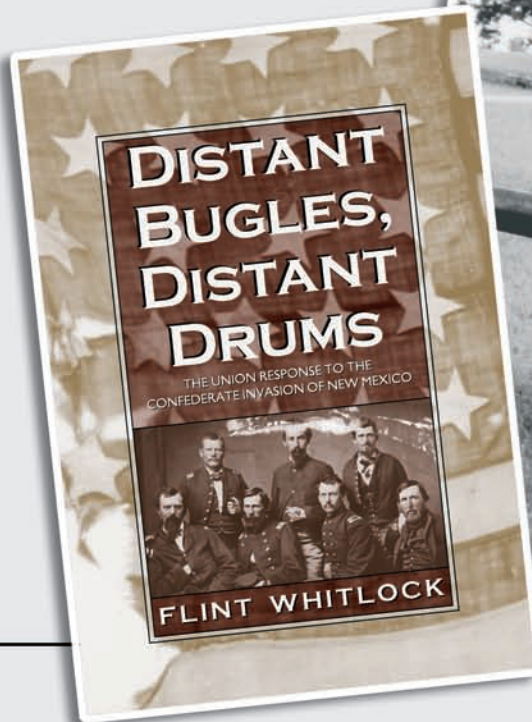

It was announced this spring that the Burndy Library will move this fall from the Dibner Building on the MIT campus to San Marino, California. It will become part of the Huntington Library, Art Collections, and Botanical Gardens. In 1999 **Richard F. Fagan**, Washington '52, donated to the library the Richard and Mary Fagan Collection, dedicated to the history of electric lighting. The Burndy Library was founded in 1941 and contains more than 50,000 volumes in the history of science and technology from antiquity to the Twentieth Century.
